

All Together Now

Summer Reading Program 2023

The Town of Chester participated in the New York State Summer Reading Program themed 'All Together Now'. The theme served as a guide for the program to celebrate working together.

Our Summer Reading Program advances literacy and academic performance by engaging children and teens in reading during the summer months. The program is designed to foster a love of reading in students of all ages by encouraging self-selected voluntary reading. These fun and creative experiences help create lifelong readers and learners.

At the Town of Chester Library, participants in 'All Together Now' were tasked with earning as many points as possible. Points were earned by reading as many books and pages as possible, but also through visiting the Library, and attending Library

sponsored performances. Summer performances included Planetarium Adventures, Birds of Prey, Rural Soul Dancing, Interactive Dance, Magician Jim Snack, and the Puppet People.

In total, the Town of Chester had nine participants who read a total of 44,977 pages across 394 books. The 1st place winner read ninety-five books and a total of 31,796 pages and won a \$50 Amazon gift card.



The second-place winner read 78 books and a total of 2,839 pages and won a Kindle Fire. All participants earned a free ice cream cone from Stewart's.

Susannah Stiehm, MBA, Poughkeepsie native, and Library Clerk for the past eighteen months or so, scrambled from her desk and duties to tackle the object of my challenge— what do you do when you look out the Town Hall window and look across to the grocery parking lot (answer must be a palindrome; that is, must spell the same forwards as backwards). Full of excitement, she tracked me down at the Senior Center to exclaim with great pride— "Spot Tops!" YES!! 
